

"Of course many things are not the same they were ten years ago; nor are the teachers the same, because they have had to change as the times did. There is something that cheers me up to keep myself working more and more, and that is that I realize how students are coming back to the so-called "wanting to learn" syndrome. Dr. Burchell commented.
