Closed Gates installed as protective measure

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This year, the administration at South Miami Senior High has decided to install "Closed Gates" as a protective measure to keep teens from trespassing. Other reasons have influenced this decision: tardies, accidents, violent crimes at Cobra Country and Herbies, fights and drag racing.

Administrators, Sam Scarneacchia and Alberto Rodriguez say that parents and neighbors were also an influence.
