As they did before in different uniforms, these familiar names were winners in the Cobras effort against Sunset.

Gandy, Council, and Victor all raced well in their events. Platt finished in first place in the pole vault competition and Lopez won the shot put event.

In addition to these competitors, Ray Moorer was heard from again this week. Moorer came in both the 110 and 330 high hurdle races. He also participated in the mile relay, which South Miami won for the second consecutive week.

Improving their season record to an undefeated 3-0, the Cobra track team scored an overwhelming 95-45 victory

over the Palmetto Panthers.

It was the overall effort that made the meet such a success. Contributions to the decisive win were made from everywhere on the track and field.

Randy Burch, Anthony Washington, and Chuck Vogt each received first place honors in their competitions. Sheridan Murphy finished first in the two-mile run, while John Gandy won three different events.
